THE EGYPTIAN ASYMMETRIC SQUATTING STATUE (II)

This is a sequel to my article ‘Een ongewoon Egyptisch hukbeeld’, published in this Journal IV/13 (1953-1954), 317-321 (with 2 pl.) and (1955), 409 = *AEB* 3352 and 62263. Subject is a rather rare type of sculpture. It depicts a man, woman or child squatting in an unconventional and appealing pose. One leg is raised (foot on the ground), and the other is folded under in the tailor’s way¹. The posture is quite functional. Raising the leg means giving support to the child under care of the nurse, the papyrus of the scribe or dignitary, the instrument of the musician and the head of the mourner² or sleeper. The article quoted ends with a chronological list of examples (Dyn. 5-Ptolemaic) mentioned in the literature. The following supplement gives the pieces I came across since.³


